Dear Saints,

For the last seven years, it has been my joy and honor to serve you as your pastor. I am thankful for the trust you have bestowed upon me in leading the congregation to be faithful to the vision that God has set for

us. Friends, our witness bears proof that we have lived into that call - to love and serve Jesus Christ, as we cultivated community and empowered our neighbors.

When I first came to Sampson's Mills, I remember distinctively my interview with the search team. Upon finishing a tour of my new surroundings, one of the members said, "I hope you are not thoroughly discouraged." I think a lot of times folks come to the Mon Valley and only see vestiges of once thriving industries and bustling community centers. I believe that remark was nestled in such thinking, but for me, it provided clarity that this place and these people needed hope. They needed a cheerleader to tell them the story that God was not done with them, with us, yet. In fact, nestled in the gospel is the truth that God does God's best work in such moments and among such people.

For much of our beginning, I embraced that call, reminding us always that even in places of perceived scarcity there is so much abundance. We sought then to build upon our strengths; like our deep commitment to the community through the food bank and Youth Club, while trying our hand at new things from senior ministry and a more expansive view of worship and music. There, we found the answer to one of the most pressing questions facing the church these days, **namely, that if we didn't exist, our community would be deeply affected and the work of the** kingdom of God in this time and place diminished.

Just as we were getting our groove, Covid hit, but instead of allowing the pandemic to derail us, we adapted our vision and mission to meet the current realities. What a tremendously creative time to be the church. We shifted online, and now folks can attend church no matter where they are or how they might be feeling. We experimented in such a way that VBS in the Park became a mainstay. We made sure families kept getting fed, children had resources for school and neighbors in recovery could continue their healing journey in community. I am most **proud that Sampson's Mills not only survived Covid, but we even thrived, albeit forever changed.** I often recount that ministry here has been in a series of thirds. The first third was about getting to know one another as we discovered what God was up to with us. The second third invited us to be faithful during the tiring and difficult times of Covid and so much societal and political **upheaval. In this third, now that the dust had settled, we didn't inch our way back but** courageously walked forward, even if not knowing exactly where God would plant us next.

This meant sharing time and prayer with our friends and faithful brothers and sisters in the McKeesport faith community to rally around disrupting gun violence, and supporting our schools, discerning barriers **that prevent us from living more fully into God's vision for us through the development of capital goals,** and connecting more intentionally and strategically with community partners to be a healing balm and loving presence in our neighborhood.

The work of this church continues even as I get ready to accept this new call as the General Minister of **our Presbytery. Sampson's Mills is fully empowered and equipped to weather this transition. Sampson's** Mills is abundantly gifted to be the church our community depends upon, and the membership has found a home in. Staff, ministry team leaders, elders, and deacons are well positioned to continue serving **God's people with lots of energy, intelligence, imagination, and love. Lastly, Saints, remember God is** faithful – steadfastly so and always!

I look forward to worshipping and sharing in ministry these next few Sundays until we say our "see you laters" on the 22nd. Know also that I will be rooting and praying for you and your ministry, and I can't wait to continue to celebrate your success and the fruit of the kingdom in which you will most certainly bear.






Session News



2024 Capital Improvement Goal Update

In the summer newsletter, Session shared status updates regarding two major capital improvements. The first goal is complete, which was the upgrades to the sound and a/v equipment. These improvements benefit both online and in-person worshippers with better

video and sound capabilities. We installed new cameras that provide a variety of views, new monitors to assist worship leaders in accessing the video displays and a new sound system and mics to enhance the sound quality and experience.

The second capital goal, accessible access to the sanctuary and fellowship hall, is one still very much in progress. So far, much of that work has been behind the scenes with architec-tural drawings, accepting bids and pulling together a funding plan.

At the August Meeting, Session approved two bids as part of our capital project goal to make the church building more accessible into the narthex/sanctuary and the fellowship hall.

One bid was approved for Warrior Concrete to complete construction of the narthex ramp off the parking lot, demolish and rebuild the narthex entrance steps and landing and complete necessary brick work to match the existing building. Additional work includes repairing and widening the concrete walkway leading to the fellowship hall to make the walk way more accessible for both food bank clients' shopping carts and for scooters and wheelchairs. The approximate cost for all the concrete work is \$49,500.00.

A second bid was accepted from **Mobile Welding Solutions** for custom pipe, aluminum railing for the narthex ramp project and stairs. The estimated cost is \$8,400.00. Session is inquiring with White Oak Borough regarding necessary building permits so to proceed with the project.

Thus far, \$10,000 has been raised via grants and a memorial gift.

Members and friends are invited to give to the project online or by check with a note indicating *Capital Project Accessibility.* Any expenses not covered by grants and special donations will come from the Capital Improvement Money Market Account, the special investment account where the sale profits of both 1677 and 1659 Lincoln Way have been deposited and are accruing interest at about 4.5% monthly.

With God's help and your support, we look forward to breaking ground soon.


Faith Formation News



Mission Team Update

The SMPC Mission Committee meets quarterly to disburse funds from the general fund. We have distributed to many organizations over the past years. Our quarterly meetings engage in discussion regarding the organizations in the community that would benefit from our support. This July we donated \$250 to the 9th Street Kitchen, a congregate feeding facility which provides 80 free meals weekly. There will be volunteer opportunities to provide meals or serve food at the facility in the future. The Salvation Army was given \$500. The 9th Street Clinic is a free clinic in McKeesport which operates near the hospital for those without insurance, we donated \$500 to provide supplies for them. The Center For Women is now located in Pittsburgh and provides shelter for homeless and destitute women in need of sanctuary, they offer services to women from all communities and we donated \$500 for their work. The PGH Presbytery operates a Lazarus Fund which provides money for rent and utilities for those in need, \$250 was provided to them. In addition, the Mission fund covered the cost for the U-Haul to collect Housewares which were donated to Duquesne Presbyterian Church Free Store. Lastly, the Intersection in McKeesport area. Our donation of \$500 will help them until they transition to a new program.

Spotlight on 9th Street Community Kitchen

Our Mission Team visited 9th Street Community Kitchen and was impressed with their mission to bring a hot meal to those in need. We decided to help fund this mission with supplies, food, and labor. We will be asking for volunteers to help us in our endeavor.

Location: The 9th Street Community Kitchen serves any who come through their doors with a hot meal every Thursday. They are currently located at the old Synagogue on Shaw Avenue in McKeesport. They would like to find a permanent place to fulfill their mission.

Serving Times: They have eat-in dinner at 4:30-5:30, with a seconds call at 5:15. Typically, 40 clients eat in and 40-50 have take out.

Feeding Program: During the warmer months they serve a hot entrée and cold sides such as macaroni salad, fruit salad, cole slaw, etc. Frozen desserts are the favorite.


During the colder months they serve a hot entrée and hot sides such as mac and cheese, mashed potatoes, and corn, etc. Desserts such as cookies from Costco or donated cakes are passed out. Client favorites are pasta and tacos.
